The afternoon program on the Panama Canal, by Robert R. McMillan was fascinating.



Mr. McMillan was named by President George Bush to the Board of the Panama Canal Commission and confirmed by the United States Senate for the post on November 19, 1989. On October 27, 1993, Mr. McMillan was elected Chairman of the Commission's Board of Directors—the first person who was not an official of the Department of Defense to serve as Chairman. McMillan outlined the historical and strategic importance of the canal and the transformation of Panama through over eighteen years of democracy, while looking forward to the future of one of the most important global passages in the world's economy.

Clearwater's Paige Railey and Tampa's Brad Kendall were among the 34 athletes named to the 2013 US National Team announced by US Sailing last month. Railey, who represented the United States at the 2012 Summer Olympics in Weymouth, England sails laser radial, and Kendall the Paralympics team Doerr, and Hugh Freund on a sonar team. Our continued support of youth and young adult sailing programs directed towards US Sailing and future Olympians, is in keeping with our mission; "Keepers of the Flame." These young sailors and their parents, many who are currently members of Florida YC's provide our clubs with future membership opportunities.

Nautical Puzzler


What is a **Sentinel or a Kellet?** Why and how is it used?

Answer

There are many times that we do not wish for our boats to move around. Usually we just tie it to the dock. When we do not have a dock available then we use "Ground Tackle" - an anchor. One of the great advantages of having a boat is that it allows us to really get away. Some of the most delightful inlets, coves or bays are there for solitude and enjoying the scenery or for or for partying with a bunch of good friends who have cruised to the same inlet. This raises the need for anchoring. Even the most protected cove has some current and of course there is the wind which will most surely blow us out to sea or into the shore while we sleep or party.

Now there are many kinds of anchors but they all work on the same principle—they are hard to pull through the bottom ground - they dig in. They are shaped to bury themselves when pulled parallel to the bottom surface. Conversely, when you want to get them up you pull straight up and they come loose. To get a good hold with the anchor you want the pull on it to be along the bottom and usually we use a heavy chain. A boat length or two is considered appropriate. If that isn't enough just let out more rode. You will be further from the anchor but the tangle will be smaller. So far so good BUT?

Suppose there are many boats in this anchorage and you can't have 300 feet to swing about if the wind shifts. Or suppose the cove is very deep and you only have so much rode. That is where a Sentinel or Kellet comes in handy. It is simply a weight fastened to the anchor line

Chapter Projects

The Pensacola Chapter of the Florida Commodores Association is very active at the Pensacola Yacht Club (PYC). It has been an objective of the Chapter to perform projects



for the yacht club which enhance the image of the club and continue its many customs and traditions. As an example, the picture on the left is of very historical significance. PYC is a charter member of the Gulf Yachting Association (GYA) and as such is required to own one of the Association's primary one design boats for traditional Capdevielle Competition

among the member clubs of the GYA. In the beginning of the GYA, this competition was held in Fish Class one design boats such as shown above. The Fish pictured is hull number One and has been part of PYC's history since 1920. The Fish is regularly inspected and maintained by the PYC Chapter FCA.

The chapter also honors distinguished members of the yacht club for their outstanding service to the club. One such honoree is Mrs Allen Dennis whose husband was the Vice Commodore of the Yacht Club and suffered a heart attack and died before he could be

elected Commodore. She is affectionately called Libba and has been providing live flowers table decorations for the dining area for over 50 years. All of the flowers are grown in her yard. A member of PYC since 1948, Libba has served the club not only with her flowers but will her outstanding spirit of volunteering wherever she can. Recently, Libba had to move to an assisted living facility but she still



manages to come to the club on special occasions. The tree pictured above is called "The Libba Tree" and was planted by the PYC Chapter to honor her dedication and commitment to the Pensacola Yacht Club.



When Pensacola Yacht Club purchased the Muldoon Estate in the 1940s, the sundial pictured to the left was a prominent fixture on the front lawn of the estate. However, following Hurricane Ivan in 2004, the sundial was removed from the lawn to permit repairs and renovation to the lawn and the clubhouse. In the interim, the sundial was forgotten. About two

years ago, the sundial was found stored in one of the clubs storage sheds with no base. The chapter decided it should be returned to a place of historical prominence on the lawn of the club. The base for the sundial was built and the complete fixture was installed in a special location so it could be viewed by the members as they enter the clubhouse. The sundial was accurately restored so it does give the accurate time as provided by the sun.

When the PYC Chapter was first organized, the chapter honored all past commodores of the club when they died regardless of whether or not they were still active members of the club. In 2008, the chapter decided to create a Memorial Plaque complete with a Ship's Bell to honor all the past commodores of the club. In the middle of the plaque is a plate with the inscription of "Crossing the Bar" by Tennyson. On the left are the names of all past commodores who were not



members of the PYC Chapter FCA. On the right are the names of the past commodores who have been members of the PYC Chapter that have died. In each of these cases, a special memorial service is conducted by the Chapter to honor them. The bell is sounded 8 times to signify their "Change of Watch" is complete and their "Tour of Duty" is finished. The memorial plaque is displayed in the Commodore's Room of the clubhouse.



PYC as a member of the Gulf Yachting Association is also a member of the United States Sailing Association, the governing body of the sport of sailing in the US. The GYA is a member "yacht racing association" of US Sailing. As a member YRA, the GYA provides representation to USSailing for its sailors, encourages participation in USSailing sanctioned national championships and provides an Appeals Committee to decide appeals involving the International Racing Rules of Sailing. PYC conducts many local, regional, and national sailing competitions and events. In order to assist local and visiting competitors, the PYC Chapter built a "mast stepping device" that enables sailors to raise and lower their masts in preparation for competitions. This device is pictured on the left. There is not a day during competitive sailing events that this device is not used.

One of the many "controversies" discussed by many of the older members of PYC was the fact that our flagpole was not a "gaff rigged" pole as displayed by many recognized yacht clubs in the US. Several plans were considered to replace the existing flagpole with a 'gaff rigged" flagpole but when the cost to do so was considered, it was decided to put it on the back burner. Recently, the PYC Chapter decided to go ahead with a plan to make the existing flagpole a traditional gaff rigged pole. The picture to the right shows the new gaff rigged pole as it currently exists on the front lawn of the club. When the PYC Chapter conducts the Sundowner Ceremony, the lowering of the US flag even has greater meaning in terms of custom and tradition.





Recently, the wife of one of PYCs oldest past commodores and a very active member of the PYC Chapter died from pancreatic cancer. Her husband, Past Commodore Billie Daughdrill, requested that the PYC Chapter consider planting a Magnolia Tree in her honor. The Chapter agreed it was very fitting to honor Joan Daughdrill, a native of Mississippi, an avid sailor and fisherman and a very active member of PYC and the FCA.



The Pensacola Yacht Club chapter continues to plan and implement projects that benefit the entire yacht club and its membership. All projects are submitted to the PYC Board of Directors for review and approval.
