

On behalf of the Florida Commodores Association, a big thank you goes to the officers, members and employees of Sarasota Yacht Club for hosting and our April meeting. It would take pages to try and summarize these **programs that are implemented and working**. I emphasize that these are proven ways to increase your Clubs revenue.

This brings up the point that if you missed the meeting, you (and your Club) missed the opportunity to learn of these programs and perhaps implement some of them to increase the revenue of your home Club. Remember, every meeting we hold will have this educational aspect and in order to learn of what ideas actually work, someone from your Club should attend the meetings.

Not only can you hear first-hand of programs that actually work but you have the opportunity to talk to those from the Clubs where these programs have been implemented. Following our business session (and lunch) we were given a very impressive presentation by Sarasota YC P/C Jeff Birnbach and Sarasota Bay Watch President Larry Stults. The program, "Community Engagement, Citizen Scientists and Eco-Restoration" outlined how SYC in conjunction with the Sarasota Bay Watch and Mote Labs partnered in a program to return scallops to the bay. Not only was the program successful for the marine environment but it was most rewarding to SYC in the form of member participation and also provided very positive and ongoing publicity for the Club.

Programs such as this and the WAVE (Wounded American Veterans Event) are great ways for your Club to give back to your community. They help generate enthusiasm among Club members, get members involved in a Club activity and bring community recognition to your Club and its members.



Having a career in the boating industry was an easy decision to make when I graduated college. I had been surrounded by the boating lifestyle since I was an infant and loved every minute of it. I officially learned to sail when I was seven years old through Edison Sailing Center in Ft. Myers whose program was once associated with the Royal Palm Yacht Club. I began racing optimist prams when I was nine years old and graduated to the laser 4.7 when I was 14. The laser 4.7 was really where I had my success with racing. In that boat, I became the District 13 Champion and State Champion with a spot to compete in nationals. I engulfed myself in any form of training available through other classes of boats and opportunities. I didn't limit myself to just dinghy sailing; I took every opportunity. I even made sure that I was able to continue sharpening my skills during

the summer by teaching sailing, kayaking, and powerboat safety. After high school, I moved into collegiate racing with the University of South Florida my freshman year and Florida State University my junior and senior years. During the summers I worked as a dock hand at South Seas Island Resort, on Captiva Island and learned the land side of boating while applying my knowledge of sailing and customer service skills.

In 2011, I was hired as the Dockmaster at the Sarasota Yacht Club with the task of building out and improving the marina from just docks, to one day offering a boating program with kayaks, paddleboards, and sailing. The first thing I tackled was the existing marina. Within five months of being hired, I received the Clean Marina Certification on behalf of The Club. This certification has proven to be a major asset to the club with renewal of our submerged land lease, receiving permits, and annual inspections. In the spring of 2012, I implemented a kayak and paddleboard rental program for our members. This program has grown from just per use rentals to annual programs and events. I continue to work with the board of directors and members to improve the facility and programs for our members. This year I installed a floating dock that is specifically for kayak, paddleboard, and sailboat launching.

With all of these changes and accomplishments, the one project that is nearest to my heart is the sailing program. With my background in sailing, I feel a certain level of importance to creating a program where sailing will thrive at the yacht club. The summer camp program has changed drastically since I took over leadership of it. I have increased the attendance from about 65 participants a year to an expected 150 participants this year. When I started working with the program, only about 10% of participants were members. This year we will have at least 60% of participants be members with the goal of only having members participate next year. We have also moved from renting boats and out sourcing camp staff from other local programs to having a small fleet of 10 optimist prams, 1 vanguard 15, and 1 SR 21 max. Additionally, the camp is now run by our own employees. The focus of the camp is on introducing and encouraging children to experience and enjoy the water. While the concentration of activities is on sailing instruction, the campers also get to go kayaking, stand-up paddle boarding, fishing, and exploring. We survey both the children and the parents every year to see what we can improve and what their favorite activities are and we apply those comments to our programming for the following year. With the growing success of the summer camp program, we offered a year round kids sailing program, adult sailing lessons, and established a start-up committee that is focusing on the direction of the program this year. I have had more adults approach me about sailing lessons than I would have every imagined and it is so encouraging! The reason I know this program is going to be a success is in how much buzz and support I am receiving from all of our members, both adults and children. In three short years, I have watched as, what I used to label, a "sleepy marina" has come alive and embraced an all-inclusive waterfront program.

### Paying it forward.....under sail

I grew up "under sail" and my life was touched by yachtsmen who were born in the late 19<sup>th</sup> and early 20<sup>th</sup> centuries. I still mention their names and tell their stories to young sailors today so many years after great men like Bob Hall, Robert Moore, Robert Wagenseil,Sr (my dad), and Robert "Skipper" Moore passed away. That's a lot of Roberts, and from them, I learned to love sailing on a 8 foot dinghy.

My sailing career began in our family's backyard in Huntington Bay on Long Island, and I received a wonderful sailing education through the youth sailing program at Huntington Yacht Club. It was there that we were taught to remember that every time we set foot onboard a boat, we have an opportunity to learn something new, no matter what our age may be. I'm still learning something new every day, and now that I'm retired, I have an opportunity to "pay it forward" as those other "Roberts" did, for a new generation of young sailors.

Following my retirement as a parish priest, I became the volunteer Program Director for the Indian Rocks Family Sailing Association. Our efforts began back in 2001 thanks to the parish I served for 18 years, Calvary Episcopal Church Indian Rocks Beach. My wife and I arrived at Calvary in September 1995 after a two month "voyage" from Huntington, Long Island to Indian Rocks Beach, Florida, onboard our home, a Beneteau Oceanis 400. Calvary Episcopal Church is truly unique in that it is located on a small cove off the Intracoastal Waterway. Within five years of our arrival, the parish built a small marina and joined forces with Pinellas Suncoast Fire and Rescue and many local businesses in order to purchase boats and create a youth sailing program for area kids. From a small one week summer camp with 10 campers, we've grown to become a year round program with over 100 kids and adults.

In 2013, as my retirement from the active priesthood approached, we became an independent 501(c) (3) and now offer our programs at Clearwater Yacht Club as well as Calvary Episcopal Church. We strive to foster the virtues of good seamanship, teamwork, leadership training, and compassion while also bringing families together and building helpful experiences that parents and kids can enjoy. Through the generosity of our benefactors, we are also able to offer the lowest tuition rates possible.

We have grown in ways we could have never imagined 15 years ago, but today, our commitment to "affordable family sailing" remains unchanged, and so does our hope and prayer that fifty years from now, there will be a newly retired person who is paying it forward for a new generation of young sailors who call the  $22^{nd}$  century their own.
